

Welcoming Remarks at JANE's 50th Concours Banquet

Welcome JANE members and guests to the Jaguar Association of New England's 50th Concours Banquet.

In the early 1980's, Jaguar Clubs of North America, our national organization, came up with the idea that a National Concours should be held every two years and creatively they called it the JCNA Biennial. In 1987, JANE took on the task of

hosting the 3rd JCNA Biennial, in Boston. The guest of honor and dinner speaker was Lofty England, who had just retired as CEO from Jaguar Cars, after a long and very successful career.

Well, Lofty began his talk with a description of his first day on the job, working for Sir William Lyons and Jaguar Cars. He then proceeded to talk for what seemed like an eternity, but was actually only 2 1/2 hours, describing what appeared to include every single day of his long, long career at Jaguar. Well, I'm not as tall as Lofty . . . maybe that is why they called him Lofty . . . nor do I have the stamina to talk for 2 1/2 hours, so don't worry – dinner will indeed start very shortly.

I was born and raised in New York City, Jamaica Queens. Being there, as a kid, I never became a car guy. This changed when I started college. I met my wife Barbara, in our college cafeteria, over a cup of coffee, discussing the art of driving my old MG TF. After college, we got married and the TF became a used Volvo P1800, which required a new "foreign car mechanic." This mechanic invited us to join a group he was organizing called EJAG of Queens, which we did.

EJAG was founded by Wolf and Laurie Toepel of Carlisle, Mass, as an association of Jaguar drivers. While our group in Queens put on some events, EJAG in Boston was the place to go for bigger and better events. So, several times a year, Barbara and I would pack up our car and head North up I-95 — what a horror that was — to Boston. It should be of no surprise that at these EJAG events many future JANE members were present: Norman and Selma Sherman, Ben Sava, Jim Sambold and Harry Parkinson, to mention a few.

During this period, Mass native Peter Gould experienced a mid-life career change and with his wife Maxine established British Auto/USA, a Jaguar parts distribution and restoration business in Manchester, New Hampshire. Peter was a great Jaguar promoter and way before Leno and Osborne, he founded the Newport Jaguar Festival. Every Memorial Day weekend, Barbara and I would pack up our Jaguar and with our young son in tow, head up I-95 — still a horror — to Newport. Peter put on a great event. I even found a video of one of these events by a Boston news station on YouTube, where Peter was interviewed.

During the same period, after attending a New England MG event, a Medway Mass Jaguar car guy named Bernie Yurt came up with the idea that there must be XK Jaguar enthusiasts, like the MG owners, who would be interested in forming a Jaguar XK club. Bernie called this club the New England XK Association — NEXKA, limited to XK owners. However, Sir William Lyons had created Jaguar Cars as a sedan manufacturer and only used sports cars and racing as a sales tool to attract buyers to his sedans. So, while NEXKA grew fast at first, by the late 1980's it became apparent that there was a large group of non-sports car Jaguar owners who were interested in joining a Jaguar club. At this point, a group of NEXKA members, Peter Gould, Herb Strachman and Carl Hanson, stepped in and re-branded NEXKA as Jaguar Association of New England — our JANE.

JANE, as you all know, is a member club of the Jaguar Clubs of North America. So, I would also like to acknowledge three individuals who kept JCNA growing through some very difficult times for the Jaguar Car Company: Fred Horner, Karen Miller and Mike Cook. Two JANE members' contributions should also be noted: Gary Hagopian, who served three terms as JCNA president and Jim Sambold, who was president of our club for five years. Along with Southern New England's Dean Cusano, they continue to preserve the history of the Jaguar marque at the newly established Coventry Foundation.

The first JANE Concours Barbara and I attended was the 1987 Biennial, as representatives of the Jaguar Touring Club NY/NJ. At check-in we were directed to the JANE hospitality room. From the very first moment we entered the room, we knew that this was going to be a great show. While we knew a few JANE members from previous events, most JANE members there were new to us . . . this changed in a flash, and before we knew it we had become old friends and fellow Jaguar drivers. This feeling of camaraderie has endured to this day.

Friday and Saturday nights, at a JANE Concours, seemed to never end – we all would stay up way too late, as Stew Bailey would unload his repertoire of Jaguar tales, all ending with his loud and infectious laugh. Additionally, it was always great talking to and enjoying the company of members . . . Jack and Nancy Capocefalo, the Roths, Carl and Signe Hanson, Tom Larson and Nancy Monaghan, Margaret Cloud Caruolo, David Moulton, Bonnie Getz, Gary and Sue Hagopian, Chuck and Patt Centore and just so many more.

So, when I volunteered for this talk, I had two objectives in mind. First, to thank all you JANE members for all the great times we have shared, and second, to encourage newer members to participate in JANE events put on by Daniel and Jeanine Graf, Dean Saluti, Marjorie Cahn, Aldo Cipriano and their co-workers, so that they too can accumulate more of these fabulous memories.

At the end of the 50th Concours Banquet, Marguerite Dennis formally presented her remarkable needlework JANE logo to the JANE membership. Below is some information about the project.

Needlepoint Information, in Marguerite's words:

In March 2019, the margins of my life changed, as I am sure it did for most of you, with the arrival of the COVID virus. Because my husband Russ and I could no longer travel to Jaguar events, and mindful that in 2023 JANE would celebrate its 50th Concours d' Elegance event, we decided to do something special for the club.

Russ drew the JANE Jaguar logo and from October 17, 2021 to May 30, 2023, I worked on a 18"x24" needlepoint canvas to be presented to the club president on August 12, 2023.

In an authentic Navajo rug there is always one clear imperfection woven into the pattern because the Navajos believe that is where the Spirit moves in and out of the rug. Well, I think my Spirit was moving all over this needlepoint because there are mistakes on nearly every line. A total of 141,700 stitches took 631 hours to compete the canvas and the needlepoint has traveled with us back and forth to Florida twice.

Every single stitch includes a piece of my heart and speaks to the affection I hold for this club and its members.

2023 JANE Concours d'Elegance Thanks

The Concours d'Elegance is usually considered the Grand Finale of yearly car events for most car clubs. JANE's Fiftieth Anniversary was anticipated to be a more memorable event than preceding years, some of which were also quite memorable. Of course, weather conditions will always enhance or hinder a favorable outcome. Fortunately, this year, we were all grateful that Mother Nature blessed us with bright sunlight throughout our Concours weekend.

A JANE Concours goes beyond being just a competition of cars. It is a culmination of dozens of hours of work by many volunteers, before, during and after the event. An Aston Martin Is a Smart Investment

My DB9 got me into MIT

MIT's Sloan School of Management partnered with the British Consulate in Boston, the Aston Martin Formula One Team, and the Aston Martin Owners Club to participate in a reception and panel discussion on "Sustainability in Extreme Innovation." AMOC's assignment was to provide the Eye Candy, as attendees strolled up the concourse into the building.

From all accounts, we did our job well, though it did require me to drive DUBLO8 through a rain shower, among

belligerent drivers and over Cambridge roads that were severely potholed and could be unfavorably compared with a Manhattan driving experience. I never ran hard aground but may have "fetched" during this trip, so annual maintenance may require front pan repainting; and I also knew I'd spend part of the next day washing the brake dust from my DB9's wheels and clearing off the water spots.



The star attraction in the lineup was Wendy and Mitch Gross's 1925 Grand Prix car, originally owned by Captain George Eyston and entered in the first British Grand Prix at

Brooklands in 1926.

This may be the oldest Aston Martin in America, and Mitch and Wendy trailered it down from New York to attend this event. Unloading it two miles away, they had hoped to

drive it to the MIT concourse but the engine quit when there was 8/10 of a mile left to go. But that didn't stop them. With Paul Varadian's help, they pushed



the car – through a rain shower – to the conference venue. That was a classic British car experience (determination conquering adversity) for all of us to appreciate.

Paul was also responsible for assembling a team of volunteers (including Sonig Varadian, Scott Carlic and Aaron Small) who helped us guide our Astons into their appropriate spots and guard them while we attended the conference. With admirable foresight, they brought their brollies.

(Continued on page 2I) September/October 2023 In addition, Chris Skidmore, MP, joined Peter Hirst, Consul General Abbott and Dame Fiona Murray in advocating a cooperative technological alliance between the UK and America to solve common environmental problems facing both countries.

Dame Fiona Murray (c) observed that sports can encourage technological development and pointed



to aerodynamics as an example. Formula One racing and America's Cup yacht racing have heightened interest in the effects of wind on objects that move, and what is learned on the F1 race track and the America's Cup sailing course may help aircraft designers build faster and more efficient passenger jets. Wind is wind ... whether it's flowing over an America's Cup jib sail, a "whale tail" of an F1 car, or a Dreamliner, so an advance in any one of these areas prompts an advance in others.



Jeff Slack (I) and Shergul Arshad (r) discussed the business side of Formula One, a sport

that has grown enormously in recent years. Jeff Slack praised Liberty Media for producing Drive to Survive https://www.youtube.com/watch?v=PSLTXPefVGE , a continuing series about F1 that not only covers the races but also spends time in the paddocks, garages and team offices to develop the human side of running a racing team.

Formula One racing is bigger than NFL football, so Jeff Slack and Shergul Arshad have a powerful message to local businesses that want to have a worldwide market: Join the Aston Martin F1 Team. Why sponsor a local team and have your name seen only in New England and less so around the US?

Let's look at the numbers. In 2022, the New England Patriots played 17 times, had 65,878 spectators in the stands at each game, with 16.7 million people watching on TV at home. In the same year, there were 18 Formula One races around the world, with an average of 294,767 spectators at each event, and an average worldwide TV viewership of 70 million. So, if you're running an international business and want to promote it through sports marketing, Formula One needs to be considered.

Cognizant saw the wisdom in allying itself with Aston Martin. A Forbes Magazine article explained last year that Cognizant, as a New Jersey advisory company in the business of technological consulting, needed the same kind of refreshing that they provided to their client companies.

Joining Aston Martin in a multi-million dollar, multi-year sponsorship contract had many goals; the first one was annunciated by Gaurav Chand: "The ultimate goal is to make that car go faster." He continued, "The biggest reason for us to invest is because racing is a sport that is so historically conducive to technology. We're doing it now with the Aston Martin F1 Team by delivering services across 12 different powers."

It has already started to pay off, as Chand explained that when he attended an F1 event in Amsterdam, Dutch clients had only recognized the Cognizant brand after joining AMR F1's team. Now they are fully aware of Cognizant's capabilities.

Going forward, Cognizant is looking forward to their AMR F1 partnership to benefit the team by assisting in the data analytics of the team's driving simulators that will show drivers how to adapt to changing track conditions.

Whew! A heady night. When the time for "Carriages" approached, we all prepared to depart. All of us were grateful that Rhiannon – shown here with Deanna Chandonnet-Binotti (r) – and the event organizers were able to have Fernando Alonzo lend us the trophy from his podium finish at the Saudi Arabia race.




Rhiannon and her team had also thoughtfully provided swag bags for all of us that included an AMR ball cap, a scented candle, a demi-bottle of cabernet and a notebook with Aston Martin, Cognizant and Aramco embossed on the leather. Very welcome, in

This past week, I broke down and bought a new Jaguar. My last new car, probably.

About a month ago, my F-Pace began to make some seriously new and different, even exciting, noises, the kind of noises that usually make us feel like we may be soon encountering rather complex work orders as well as significant redistributions of wealth. Uh-oh!

So, after duly procrastinating for my mandatory four-week period of indecision, I booked the car into Jaguar Peabody for some diagnostic work, gently drove it

down there, and, while the boffins in the shop puzzled over what those serious noises might possibly signify within their diagnostic range of "What noise?" to "Holy S__t!," I wandered around the showroom and found, down at the far end, past all the Landys and the lone I-Pace, sales guru Fritz Bonaventure (who sold me my original F-Pace back in the day) as well as a brand-spanking new 2023 F-Pace with both the new engine and the upper middle-class interior I've been lusting after for some years. What a coincidence!

After some chit-chat, not entirely idle, Fritz kindly murmured to me, "Wanna drive that new F-Pace? The black one sitting right there behind you?" And with that kind, thoughtful and no-obligation offer on the table, I was done. Not quite lambs to the slaughter, but close.

Long story short: by the following Tuesday we'd arrived at a price that my bank advised me was probably possible for me if not quite what Consumer Reports might recommend with enthusiasm. By Thursday noon, we'd passed a variety of documents and dollars around, amid smiles, bonhomie and pledges of eternal camaraderie. And then! Lo and Behold! The new F-Pace was, as Daffy Duck used to point out with his sthpluttering listhp, "Itsth mine! Itsth mine! Itsth all mine!!!"

As you may recall, I wrote about this new engine in the Cat a couple years back. It's a double overhead cam 3-litre in-line six-cylinder engine with variable valve timing, a turbo-charger and, driven by a belt-driven 48-volt electric generator/motor, a supercharger that fills in the soft spots in the turbo's boost curve, especially at low engine speeds.

Said 48V electric generator/motor also starts the engine and performs other housekeeping chores as needed, while also regenerating electrical energy on the overrun. This qualifies the car to be called a "mild" hybrid. To my way of thinking, it's not really, but no matter. What it all is, really, is a VERY high output engine with great efficiency. 3 litres displacement, remember, generating 395 hp at 5500 rpm and 406 ft./lbs. of torque across a very broad band from 2,000 to 5,000 rpm. As a result, it pushes the 4,400 lb. F-Pace to 60 mph in a little over 5 seconds, they say. I haven't tried that stunt (yet).

I'll craft a more expansive write-up in a future issue of the Cat, but so far, the car is, when compared to my 2017 F-Pace, very quiet, smooth and luxurious, with a plethora of nice details. It's also all black, including blacked out rear windows, wheels and chrome, so all I need now to establish my image of serious mien is a full-time driver named something like Helmut, Viggo, Giuseppe, or possibly, Big Max. Dressed in black, of course. Dark shades, of course. Folded arms. Of course! Bad Dude! Of course!! (Meanwhile, I'll lounge inconspicuously in the blacked out luxurious back seats, imagining I'm a tycoon or something.)

Thanks for reading this. Happy Leaf-Peeping, Halloween and Veterans Day. I'm good to go, as they say.


